About PAC Survey on Land Use Planning



About the Survey



- Survey to PAC
 - Dates: May through early June of 2025
 - Solicited Group: Policy Advisory Council (PAC)
 - Subject: OFA land use planning positions
 - 6 selected topics were considered by respondents
 - Plus the option to submit any land use planning comments
- 30 of the 90 PAC representatives completed the survey
 - 33.3% response rate
 - Strong enough for general interpretations of PAC positioning


Locally Prime Agricultural Areas



OFA has proposed the creation of <u>locally</u> prime agricultural areas, a policy that would protect rural lands where prime agricultural lands are not available in a municipal jurisdiction.

A new locally prime agricultural area policy for Ontario is supported

- 9/10 respondents supported this policy
 - 60% support that policy being mandatory
 - 30% support that policy being optional



Topic 2/7 Spatial Separation Formulae




OFA has proposed the creation of new separation distance formulae that would spatially setback greenhouses and grain dryers from sensitive land uses (e.g. dwellings, churches, etc.)

New spatial separation formulae

- More than half of respondents in favour of greenhouse separation
- Just shy of 7/10 supported separation distance for grain dryers

Some concerns from respondents

- Just under 1/2 concerned that greenhouses, grain dryers, and livestock facilities would compete for separated land
- About half of respondents want more setbacks and controls placed on cannabis



Topic 3/7 The Greenbelt





OFA has an explicit policy to review all *Greenbelt Plan* amendments and a general policy to review all proposed legislative changes;

OFA must also prepare for the upcoming coordinated review of Ontario's land use plans

Support witnessed for the *Greenbelt Plan* and a new provincial plan

- About 2/3 of respondents supported maintaining the explicit policy to review Greenbelt Plan amendments
- Almost 4/5 of respondents supported a new Farmbelt Plan to protect agriculture outside the Greenbelt Plan





Topic 4/7 The Niagara Escarpment



OFA has proposed the dissolution of the **Niagara Escarpment Commission;**

OFA must also prepare for the upcoming coordinated review of Ontario's land use plans

Respondents signaled lack of consensus on the Niagara Escarpment Commission

Majority of respondents unsure about support for existing OFA positions regarding the Niagara **Escarpment Commission**

Broadly, there is a desire among respondents for a simpler land use planning system in Ontario—the NEP being one of many layers.



Topic 5/7 Natural Heritage



OFA has proposed that natural heritage and prime agricultural areas should be mutually exclusive designations;

OFA proposes that the government should compensate farmers for environmental services provided by farmland

Respondents unsure of mutual exclusivity of NHFA and prime ag

- Even split between those in favour, opposed, and unsure
- But most respondents support permitting more agricultural uses in NHFAs

Environmental services compensation popular

Only 15% unsure or opposed





OFA has stated that residential *lot creation* should not occur in *prime agricultural areas*, with an exception for *surplus farm dwellings*

General support for the existing lot creation policies in Ontario's *rural* and *prime areas*

- Almost 4/5 respondents support only 1 lot severance per parcel in *prime ag*
- General support for 2-4, or more, severances within non-prime rural lands
- About 1/2 support "lot severance sterilization"
 - Remainder support lengthy cooldown

Respondents generally see lot creation as either problematic or neutral.

The survey asked what kind of net outcomes would happen if more severances were allowed:

- 1/2 stated the outcome would be mostly negative
- 1/3 stated the outcome would be net neutral
- Remaining 16% stated the outcome would be positive

Topic 7/7 Free-form comments



OFA solicited for general comments on land use planning

- Lack of trust in planning authorities, municipal and provincial
- Controversial land uses such as cannabis and landfills continue to be a concern
- Respondents were also concerned about farm worker housing policies and how consistently they are interpreted or applied
- Called for stronger farmland protection policies and more transparency regarding how development proposals are drafted and considered at the local or provincial level
